The museum is open during special activities at camp and by appointment. To schedule an appointment to tour the museum call the ONSC History Committee Chairman at 336-552-3555.



With the aid of Ernest Thompson Seton, Daniel Carter Beard and James E. West the BSA grew into the country's greatest youth organization. Learn about this rich history.

OLD NORTH STATE COUNCIL

In 1992 General Greene Council in Greensboro and Uwharrie Council headquartered in High Point merged to form the Old North State Council. Cherokee Council which covered Alamance, Rockingham, Person, and Caswell counties joined in '94 to form today's alignment.

Order of the Arrow

Tsoiotsi Tsogalii Lodge 70

The Old North State Council Scout Museum was constructed through the encouragement and financial support of our local Order of the Arrow lodge, Tsoiotsi Tsogalii. In early 2009 the lodge approved use of the lower level of the Allan "Doc" Lewis Building for the home of a Boy Scout museum. Funds were allocated for construction and with countless volunteer hours contributed, a beautiful space has been created for the display of our local and national Boy Scouting history.



The Order of the Arrow arrived in 1933 in the south-eastern United States when Tali Taktaki Lodge 70 was started at Camp Graystone located south of Greensboro. With the addition of Tslagi Lodge 163 in 1939 and Uwharrie Lodge 208 in 1941 a rich history developed. The lodges promoted camping and provided leadership on summer camp staffs. Each summer Scouts were treated to moving ceremonies and developed lasting memories.

The museum has displays on each lodge and on area and national events that they attended.
